The company will maintain the highest level of readiness and training enabling delivery of firefighting and emergency rescue services in a safe, competent and caring manner

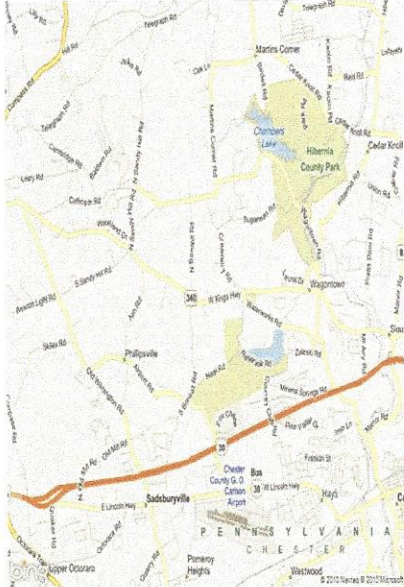
Company Background

The Wagontown Volunteer Fire Company has been serving the residents of West Caln and West Brandywine Townships since 1947. Wagontown operates with a base of 40 volunteers who are firefighters, fire police and specialized rescue technicians who are trained to handle a variety of incidents.

Later in this report we will cover what apparatus we have in service and advancements we are making to ensure the most adequate equipment and trained personnel are available to our residents.

Wagontown has partnered with the Westwood Fire Company EMS to ensure our residents are protected not only from fire and rescue incidents but EMS needs as well to ensure a timely response to all types of fire, rescue and medical emergencies that may occur.

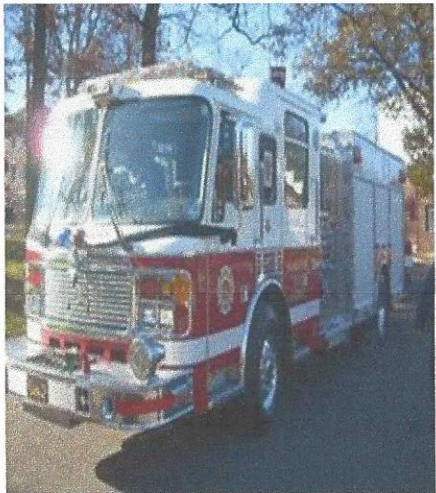

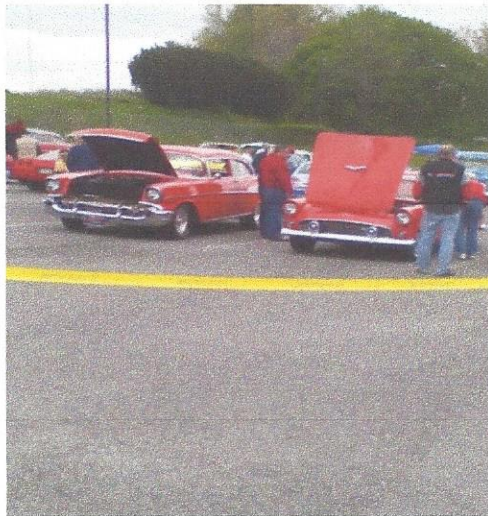

2017 Activities

- The Wagontown Volunteer Fire Company is comprised of over 40 active volunteers. This past year was a busy year for the fire company answering over 365 calls or one a day for service, with **380** total calls.
- There were a number of serious fires that tied members up for well over four hours on each incident. One of which was the Nursing home fire in West Chester. And a number of house fires in our local response area.
- The company also held many fund raising activities and special events such as, Chicken BBQ's, Soup sales, Turkey Fair and a variety of other events.
 - Hall rentals continue to flourish as well as Bingo
- Participated in the Annual Father's Day car show at West Brandywine Township's facilities and was able to work in conjunction with our BBQ.
- Provided stand by services for events such as the Coatesville Country Club fireworks and other requested events this year.
 - Fire prevention activities kept us busy during October
- And in December our second annual Christmas tree sale which went very well for us as we sold out in three weeks.

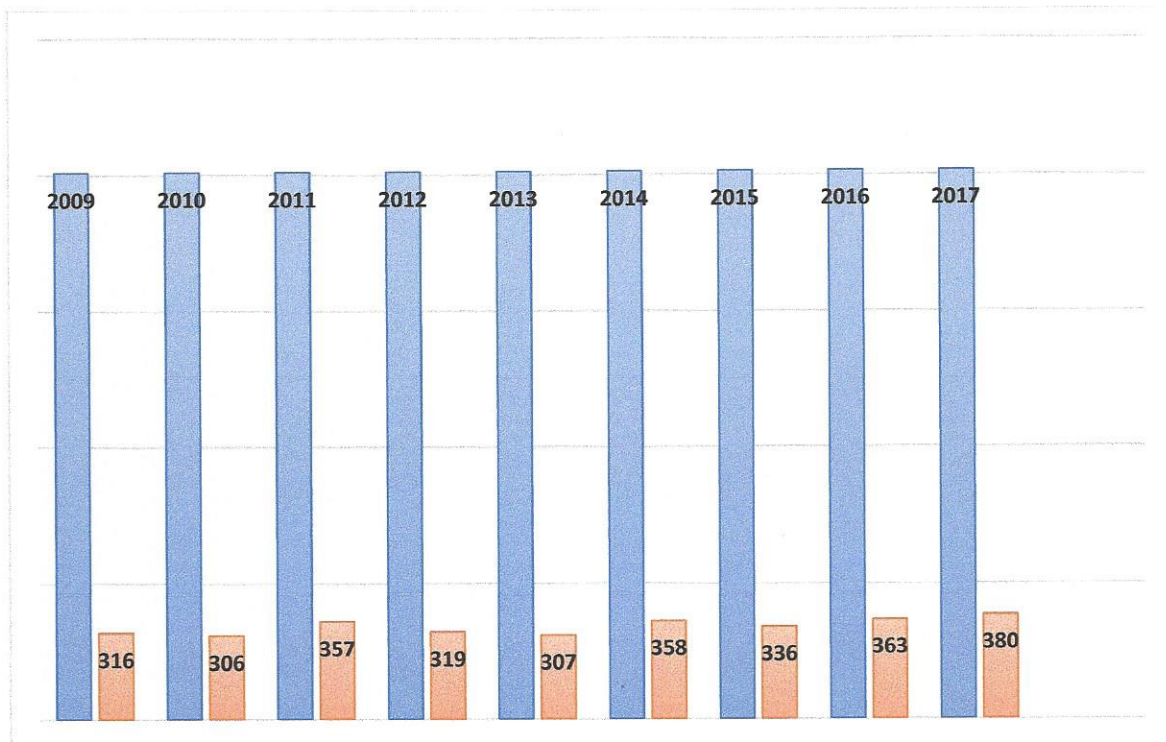


Review of 2017

- This year brought some very interesting events our way; it was the year for very different types of incidents.
- The company trained a lot this year, not only in house but attended numerous training programs offered by the National Fire Academy in which the chief officers attended, Members also attended State and Local fire training programs sponsored by the Chester County Fire Training academy. These classes included tanker emergencies, building construction and Fire I and Fire II programs.
- Also this year completed a Structural Burn Session at the Counties Public Safety Training Center.
- During the spring and fall, we also handled a number of brush related fires and controlled burn complaints.

Grants Received

Grants are an important part of the Wagontown Volunteer Fire Company operation, using the grant money we have received over the course of the last few years we were able to make many safety improvements for our equipment and firefighters.

- 2017 – The Fire Services grant from the Pennsylvania Fire Commissioner’s Office gained the fire company \$15,000.00 for our fire grant. This grant was used to upgrade our exhaust removal system in the firehouse as well as upgrade the scene lighting on our Engine and Rescue with new LED lighting.
- Pa American Water Co. \$500 award for the purchase of items for the members for our annual banquet in April.
- The Company took delivery of our new traffic unit which was funded through the fireman’s relief association. This provided the fire police unit a more reliable and functional unit to operate with when controlling traffic at incident scenes.
- The Company also was awarded Assistance to Firefighters Grant from FEMA to replace the Brush Tanker. \$290,000 was awarded to the company to purchase a new 3,000 gallon tanker which has been ordered and look for a mid to end of summer delivery.
- The company also received a grant from the Fireman’s Charitable Foundation which funded our second hood project. In an effort to cut down on the risk of cancer exposure we implemented a second hood program which allows firefighters a spare hood to change out and wash after every incident in which they were worn,

Task force membership

- The Fire Company still maintains membership in the following Task Forces for the Southeastern PA region
 - **Fire Task Force** – Still an active member with the South Eastern PA Fire Task Force in Chester County. And attended training this year with the Task Force
 - **Regional Rescue Task Force** – With the company specializing in Water Rescue and Trench Recue. Training in these areas continued with members attending courses.
 - **Wildland Firefighting** – Company continues to support the PA Bureau of Forestry District 17 with equipment and manpower on wildland fires.

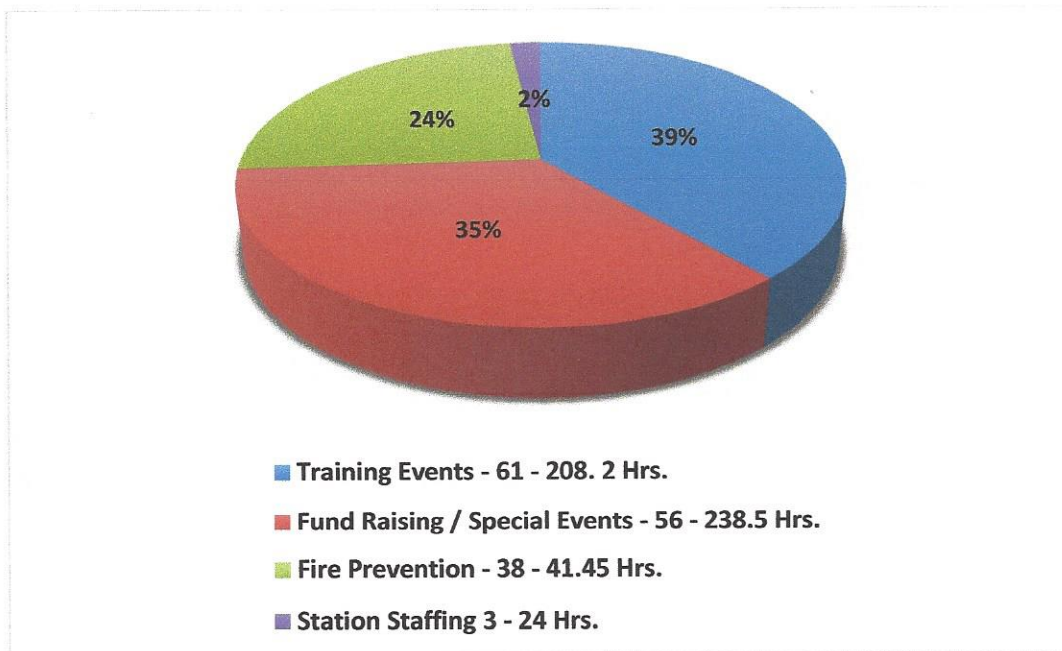

You will see the category called Station Staffing; this was designed to give members credit for staying at the firehouse during in climate weather, or during special events or programs. What this did was provide a crew ready to respond right from the fire station instead of driving from home to the firehouse first.

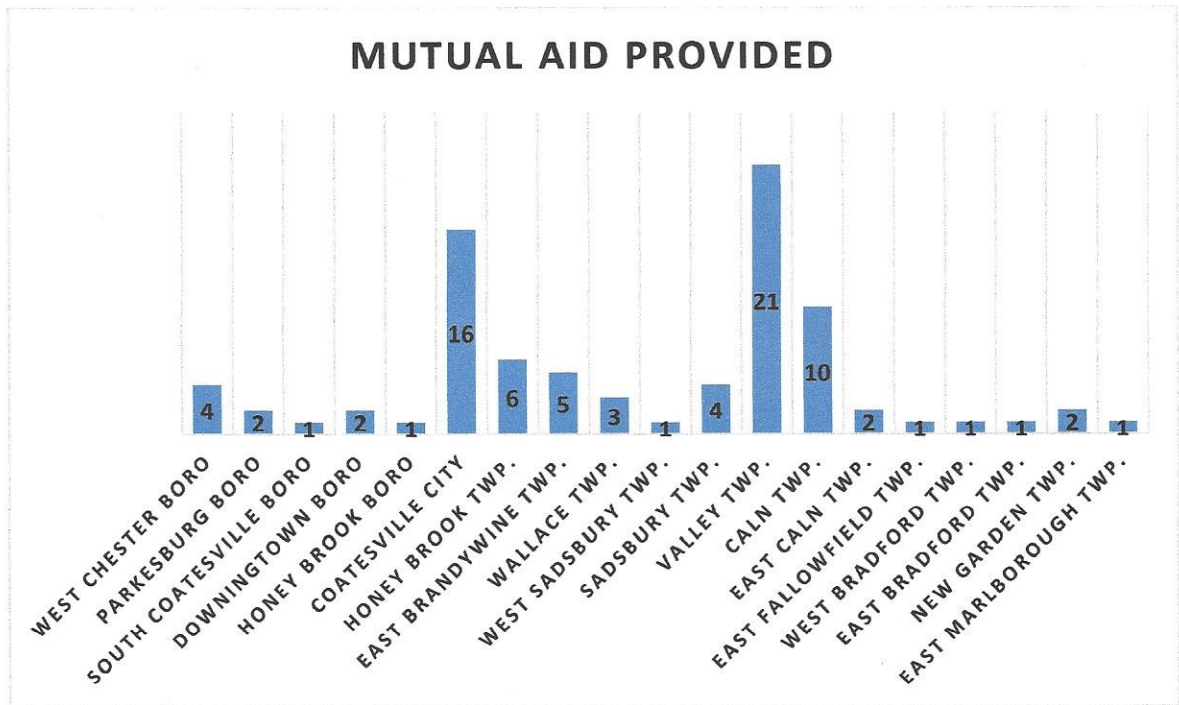


Mutual Aid - Building partnerships

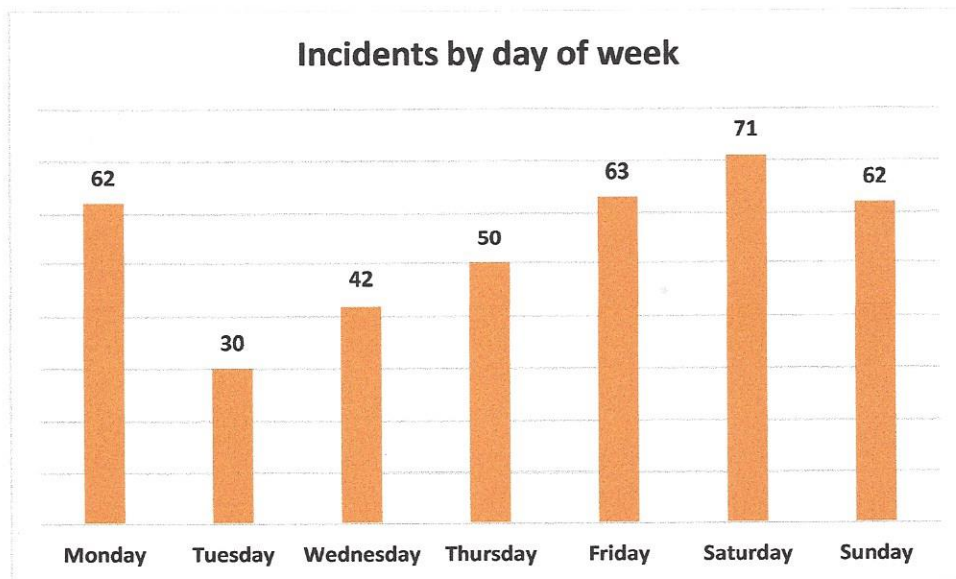
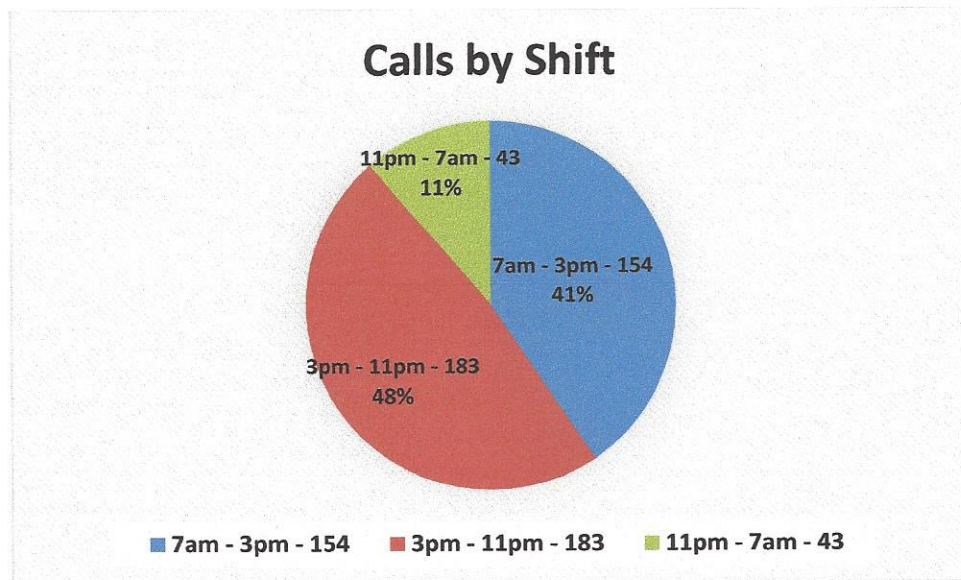
Incidents handled

This heading is where we would like to show those who read our report what it is we responded to last year. As you can see, our responses were to a good number of emergencies, this is why training of our members is ever so important.



Times of Incidents

In this section we are showing when and what days our incidents occurred on, we are fortunate enough to have members of the fire company who work for *West Caln Township* who are allowed to leave work to assist us on incidents during their work times. This has been very valuable to us as a fire company but also the residents, as this allows us to staff and respond faster during this time when most fire companies are light on firefighters.



Statistical Data

In this section we are going to provide some data on how we did during fire suppression, how fast we respond and on average how many members are responding to any given incident.

It is important for us to provide this information as we recently underwent our inspection process for the Insurance Service Organization (ISO) which rates our firefighting abilities and capacities. In both West Caln and West Brandywine we increased our abilities and ratings which mean a savings in fire insurance for the residents.

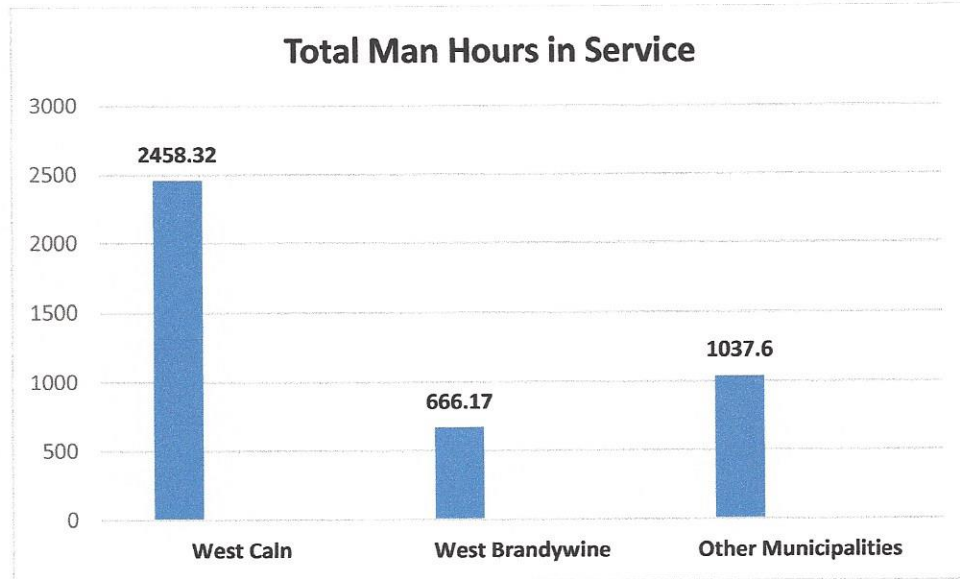

With a total number of incidents at 380 with a total of 4306 responding personnel we averaged 12 members per incident and had an average response time from dispatch to on scene of 7:30 minutes.

Which equated to one more person responding over last year and a decrease in response time of :29 seconds

Goals and Achievements

This year saw the addition of a new traffic unit, a 2017 Ford F350 Super Duty chassis. Knapheide Utility Body which holds various traffic control equipment as well as carries a crew of 5 safely to an incident scene. The vehicle is equipped with state of the art warning and traffic control lighting and can also be used to support incident scenes in a variety of ways.

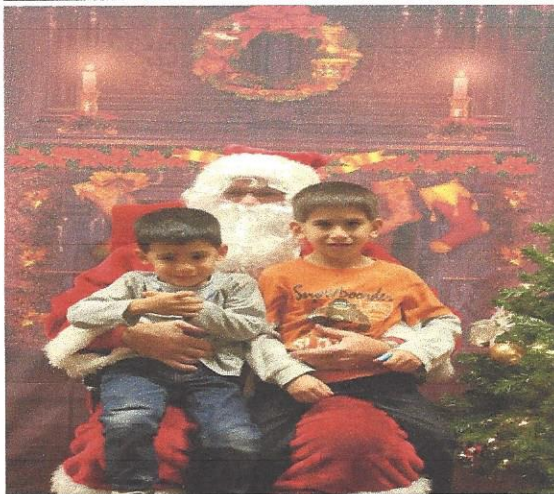

Giving Back to the Community

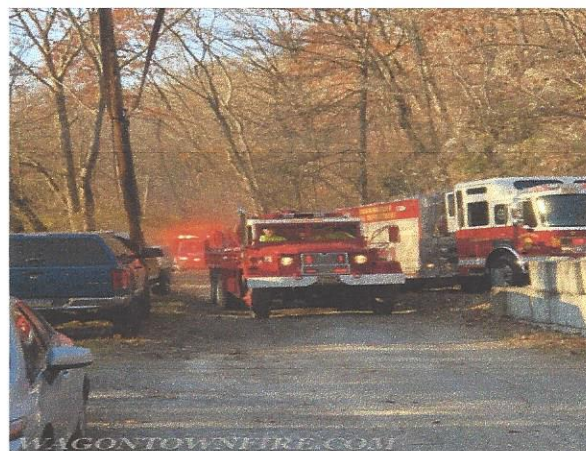
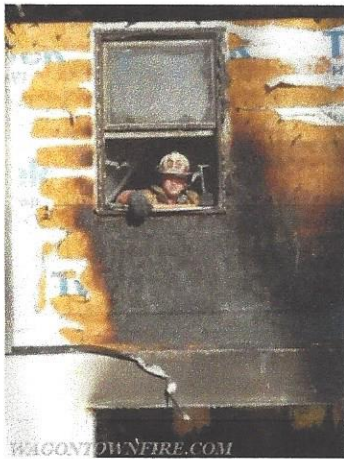

We again assisted with the West Caln PD Toys for children program by giving Santa a sleigh for the delivery of toys.

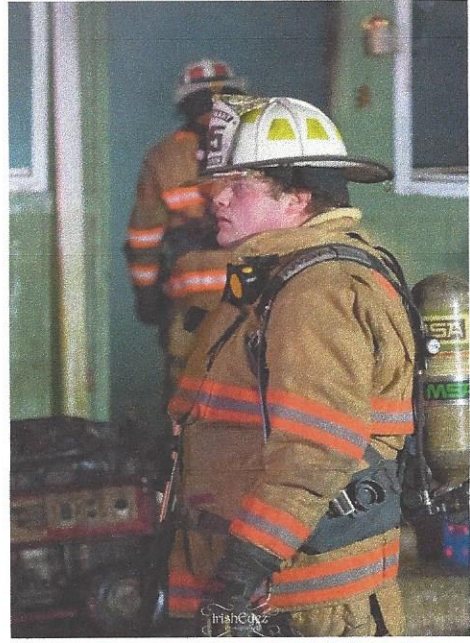
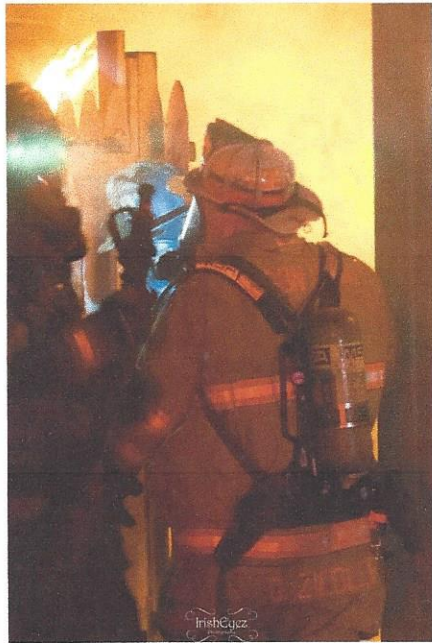
